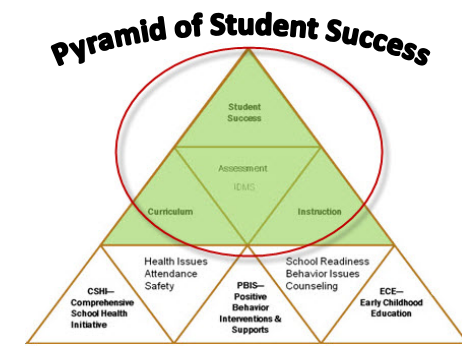




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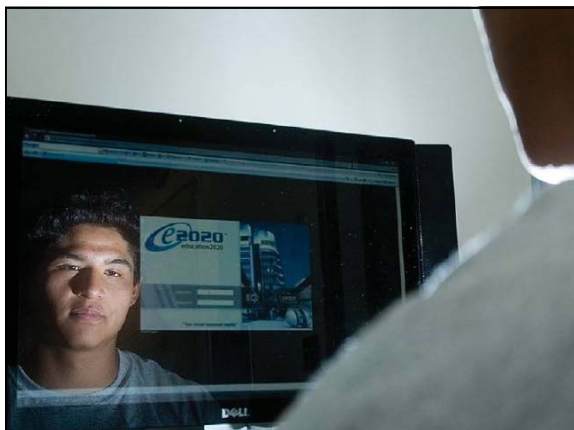
# Snowline School District Online Learning Opportunities for Student Success

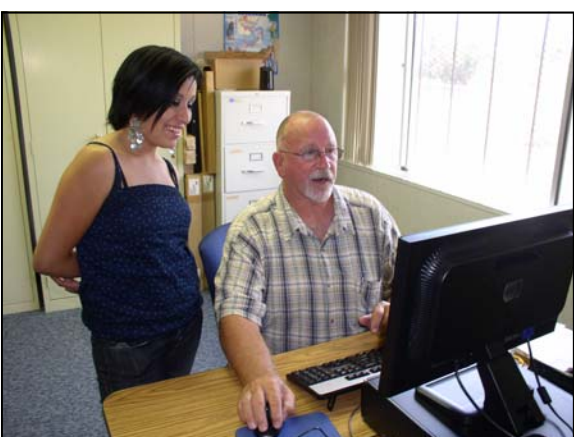

Dave Abdalla runs the online program at Chaparral High School. At Chaparral, most students utilize the program for credit recovery. It is just one more way the school is trying to encourage students to complete their credits towards graduation.

Working in a large computer lab, he is able to accommodate up to 35 students at one time. "The great thing about this program is that I am able to individually design or customize the course to the credits each student needs." This is the second year Chaparral has utilized the program.
