School Profile

Quail Valley Middle School is located in the eastern region of the district's boundaries and serves students in grades six through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2008-09 school year, 1086 students were enrolled, including 10% in special education, 12% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 46% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch. Quail Valley Middle School achieved a 2009 Academic Performance Index (API) score of 834 and met all 2009 Adequate Yearly Progress criteria.

Quail Valley Middle School is focused on providing a rigorous, standards-based program specially designed for the transitional period between the K-5 self-contained classroom and the departmentalized high school program. Instructional periods are structured in 80-minute time blocks supplemented with a daily 30-minute advisory period.

Sixth grade students are grouped into "teams"; each team shares the same teachers for math, social science, science, language arts, and physical education. This structure allows teachers to collaborate on student progress across all subject areas. Staff and students are challenged to meet high expectations and exceed state standards.

Student Achievement

National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP)

NAEP is a nationally representative assessment of what America's students know and can do in various subject areas. Assessments are conducted periodically in math, reading, science, writing, the arts, civics, economics, geography, and U.S. history. Student scores for reading and math are reported as performance levels (i.e., basic, proficient, and advanced) and the participation of students with disabilities (SD) and English language learners (ELL) are reported based on three levels (identified, excluded, and assessed).

In the following table, only a sample group of California's schools and districts participate in the NAEP testing cycle. Therefore, students in any particular school or district may not be included in these results. The NAEP reflects state test results and is not reflective of either Snowline Joint Unified School District or Quail Valley Middle School. Note: Comparisons of student performance on the NAEP and student performance on the Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program assessments cannot be made without an understanding of the key differences between the two assessment programs. Additionally, the NAEP only provides state test results for grades four and eight. The California Standards Tests (CSTs) are based on a different set of standards than the NAEP assessments. Standardized State Assessments

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment

(CAPA). The CSTs show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, ten, and eleven.

Student scores are reported as performance levels. Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Quail Valley Middle School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade seven. The physical fitness test measures each student's ability to complete six fitness tasks in six major areas. Students who either meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be physically fit or in the "healthy fitness zone." Academic Performance Index

California uses the results of STAR testing to calculate the Academic Performance Index (API) which is used to measure school performance, set academic growth targets, and monitor progress over time. The API is a numeric index between 200-1000 that measures student performance in grades two through eleven. An API score of 800 is the state's designated performance target for all schools. Test results are weighted and a formula is applied to determine API.

Growth Targets: For schools with an API under 800, the state requires a gain of 5% of the difference between the school's actual API and 800. Growth Targets apply not only schoolwide, but to each numerically significant subgroup as well. Schools/subgroups that have achieved an API of 800 or above must maintain their scores.

Statewide Rank: All schools in California are categorized according to type (elementary, middle, high) and are placed on a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the highest.

Similar Schools Rank: School performance is also compared to other similar schools in the state, based on demographic characteristics, and ranked 1 to 10 within a grouping of 100 schools.

Adequate Yearly Progress

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires that all students perform at or above the proficient level on the state's standards-based assessment by the year 2014. Meeting Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) milestones helps determine

whether students are reaching proficiency level targets set by NCLB. AYP requires annual evaluation and reporting of the academic progress of all students and defined student subgroups.

For the 2008-09 AYP cycle, elementary and middle schools must achieve a 46% or higher proficiency rate in English/Language Arts and 47.5% or higher proficiency rate in math on the California Standards Test (CST). Additional criteria contributing to whether or not a school demonstrates AYP include achieving a 95% or above participation rate on the CST and obtaining an API growth score of 650 or increasing the API growth by 1 point.

No Child Left Behind (NCLB)

The No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act is part of the Federal Title I funding program designed to support additional staffing and programs to meet the needs of low-income, low achieving students, and other designated students with special needs. Schools may apply, based upon their student demographics, for one of two types of Title I funding: Title I Schoolwide or Title I Targeted Assistance. Title I Schoolwide schools use federal funds for schoolwide improvement of student achievement. Title I Targeted Assistance schools use federal funds to help those students who meet specific program criteria. In 2008-09, Quail Valley Middle School did not participate in the Title I program and is therefore not required to comply with program mandates.

Any school receiving Title I funds is required to comply with respective program testing and reporting activities, achieve specific levels of student proficiency, and monitor school progress towards meeting established goals. California Adequate Yearly Progress calculations determine whether a Title I school has met performance goals. Schools not meeting specific AYP criteria enter Program Improvement, a monitoring system and curriculum enhancement program designed to help schools to increase student proficiency levels. School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Quail Valley Middle School's original facilities were built in 1995; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

- Handicap accessibility upgrades
- Installation of exterior, web-based surveillance system
- Resurfaced asphalt throughout campus
- Expansion of existing phone system
- Installation of new flooring in three classrooms

Every morning before school begins, the lead day custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Two day custodians and five evening custodians are assigned to Quail Valley Middle School. The day custodians are responsible for:

- Office Area Cleaning
- Cafeteria Setup/Cleanup
- Special Events Preparations
- General Classroom Cleaning

Restrooms are checked every half hour throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Comprehensive Classroom Cleaning
- Restrooms

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Deferred Maintenance

Quail Valley Middle School participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the 2008-09 school year, Quail Valley Middle School received \$41,425 in deferred maintenance funds for the repair and/or maintenance of:

- Electrical Systems
- Floor Systems
- Other Systems

For the 2008-09 school year, the district has budgeted \$427,000 for the deferred maintenance program. This represents 0.7 % of the Snowline Joint Unified School District general fund budget.

Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Quail Valley Middle School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Quail Valley Middle School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Tuesday, August 11, 2009. During fiscal year 2008-09, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use.

Rating Description

Good: The school is maintained in good repair with a number of non-critical deficiencies noted. These deficiencies are isolated, and/or result from minor wear and tear, and/or are in the process of being mitigated.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, the following individuals patrol the campus, entrance areas, and designated common areas: one campus monitor, three teachers, counselors, and all administrators. Five campus monitors, a counselor, and all administrators monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and common student activity areas. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, teachers, three campus monitors, and all administrators monitor student behavior and ensure students either leave campus or travel to after-school activities in a safe and orderly manner.

Quail Valley Middle School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Quail Valley Middle School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in April 2009.

Classroom Environment

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Quail Valley Middle School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and

minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline and proactive measures are employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules and demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation.

Curriculum & Instruction

Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Quail Valley Middle School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. Professional development activities continue to support the expanding implementation of Focus on

Standards (FOS) into grade level and course collaboration efforts. Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by FOS coaches (designated school administrators and teacher representatives) using tools such as state assessment results, teacher surveys, NCLB requirements, and state curriculum frameworks and standards to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels.

During the 2008-09 school year, Quail Valley Middle School participated in one district-sponsored staff development day. Site level implementation of FOS at Quail Valley Middle School takes place every Monday afternoon. Teachers meet in grade-level and department teams to analyze assessment results, redirect instruction accordingly, and plan intervention. Training activities focus on essential standards and school climate in alignment with the school plan and schoolwide goals. Staff consider CST results, district benchmark performance levels, student surveys, and discipline data to identify teacher training needs.

Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training sessions as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula. During the 2008-09 school year, district offerings included:

- Response to Intervention
- DIBELS Assessment Administration Training
- Pacing, Assessments, and Instructional Pieces
- Reading Intervention Training for Upper Grades
- Differentiated Instruction Training for Gifted & Talented Students
- Writing Instruction
- Research Based Best Practices Based on Dr. Riggs' Work
- FOS - Collaboration
- Special Education

Quail Valley Middle School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. Instructional aides are provided targeted training focused on teaching strategies and curriculum content. Classified support staff receive job-related training from department supervisors and district representatives.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Quail Valley Middle School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 22, 2009, the Snowline Joint Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution #10-932 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English

learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARC's the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2009-10 school year, Snowline Joint Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Professional Staff

Counseling & Support Staff

Quail Valley Middle School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Quail Valley Middle School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

Teacher Assignment

During the 2008-09 school year, Quail Valley Middle School had 39 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's

degree, possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects. In the table below, which identifies the number of classrooms taught by NCLB-compliant and non-compliant teachers, high poverty schools are those schools in the highest quartile for student participation defined by the free and reduced price meal program. Low poverty schools are those schools that are in the lowest quartile of program participation.

Expenditures Per Student

For the 2007-08 school year, Snowline Joint Unified School District spent an average of \$7,407 of total general funds to educate each student (based on 2007-08 audited financial statements and in accordance with calculations defined in Education Code §41372).
