School Profile

Heritage School is located in the eastern region of Phelan and serves students in grades kindergarten through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2010-11 school year, 564 students were enrolled, including 4% in special education, 6% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 22% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch. Heritage School achieved a 2011 Academic Performance Index (API) score of 890.

Heritage School has held students and staff to the highest standards which has proven successful since 1995. School administration and teachers believe that students demonstrate success in many ways beyond academics, including respectful behavior, excellent work habits, and involvement in such extracurricular activities as service organizations, clubs, and organized sports. Heritage School's record of success speaks volumes, consistently ranking among the highest performing schools in the High Desert region and San Bernardino County.

Student Achievement

Standardized State Assessments

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including the California Standards Tests (CSTs); the California Modified Assessment (CMA), and the California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA). The CSTs show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. The CSTs include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, ten, and eleven.

Student scores are reported as performance levels. Detailed information regarding the STAR program results for each grade and performance level, including percent of students not tested, can be found on CDE's Standardized Testing and Reporting Results website at <http://star.cde.ca.gov>.

Physical Fitness

In the spring of each year, Heritage School is required by the state to administer a physical fitness test to all students in grade five and grade seven. The physical fitness test measures each student's ability to complete fitness tasks in six major areas.

Students who either meet or exceed the standards in all six fitness areas are considered to be in the "healthy fitness zone." The chart disclosed in this document reports only the percentage in each category, not a cumulative total of the results for categories 4 of 6 and 5 of 6. Academic Performance Index

California uses the results of STAR testing to calculate the Academic Performance Index (API) which is used to measure school performance, set academic growth targets, and monitor progress over time. The API is a numeric index between 200-1000 that measures student performance in grades two through eleven. An API score of 800 is the state's designated performance target for all schools. Test results are weighted and a formula is applied to determine API.

Growth Targets: For schools with an API under 800, the state requires a gain of 5% of the difference between the school's actual API and 800. Growth Targets apply not only schoolwide, but to each numerically significant subgroup as well. Schools/subgroups that have achieved an API of 800 or above must maintain their scores.

Statewide Rank: All schools in California are categorized according to type (elementary, middle, high) and are placed on a scale of 1 to 10, with 10 being the highest.

Similar Schools Rank: School performance is also compared to other similar schools in the state, based on demographic characteristics, and ranked 1 to 10 within a grouping of 100 schools.

Adequate Yearly Progress

The Federal No Child Left Behind Act (NCLB) requires that all students perform at or above the proficient level on the state's standards-based assessment by the year 2014. Meeting Adequate Yearly Progress (AYP) milestones helps determine whether students are reaching proficiency level targets set by NCLB. AYP requires annual evaluation and reporting of the academic progress of all students and defined student subgroups.

For the 2010-11 AYP cycle, elementary and middle schools must achieve a 67.6% or higher proficiency rate in all subgroup populations for English/Language Arts and 68.5% or higher proficiency rate in math on the California Standards Test (CST). Additional criteria contributing to whether or not a school demonstrates AYP include achieving a 95% or above participation rate on the CST and obtaining an API growth score of 710 or increasing the API growth by 1 point.

No Child Left Behind (NCLB)

The No Child Left Behind (NCLB) Act is part of the Federal Title I funding program designed to support additional staffing and programs to meet the needs of low-income, low achieving students, and other designated students with special needs. Schools may apply, based upon their student demographics, for one of two types of Title I funding: Title I Schoolwide or Title I Targeted Assistance. Title I Schoolwide schools use federal funds for schoolwide improvement of student achievement. Title I Targeted Assistance schools use federal funds to help those students who meet specific program criteria. In 2010-11, Heritage School did not participate in the Title I program and is therefore not required to comply with program mandates.

Any school receiving Title I funds is required to comply with respective program testing and reporting activities, achieve specific levels of student proficiency, and monitor school progress towards meeting established goals. California Adequate Yearly Progress calculations determine whether a Title I school has met performance goals. Schools not meeting specific AYP criteria enter Program Improvement, a monitoring system and curriculum enhancement program designed to help schools to increase student proficiency levels. School Facilities & Maintenance

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Heritage School's original facilities were built in 2001; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority.

Every morning before school begins, custodian inspect facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. Two day custodians and three evening custodians are assigned to Heritage School. The day custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Cafeteria setup/cleanup
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- Special events preparations

Restrooms are checked frequently throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodians are responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

Deferred Maintenance

Heritage School participates in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provides dollar-for-dollar matching funds to assist school districts with major repairs or replacement of existing school building components. Deferred maintenance projects generally include roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior/exterior painting, and floor systems. During the 2010-11 school year, Heritage School received \$24,691 in deferred maintenance funds for the repair and/or maintenance of:

- Plumbing
- Paving Systems

For the 2011-12 school year, the district has budgeted \$250,000 for the deferred maintenance program. This represents 0.4% of the Snowline Joint Unified School District general fund budget.

Facilities Inspection

The district's maintenance department inspects Heritage School on an annual basis in accordance with Education Code §17592.72(c)(1). Heritage School uses a school site inspection survey to identify unsafe or hazardous conditions and facility improvement needs. The most recent school inspection took place on Thursday, November 03, 2011. Deficiencies noted in the school inspection survey were corrected immediately by the district's maintenance department. During fiscal year 2010-11, all restrooms were fully functional and available for student use.

Rating Description

Good: The school is maintained in good repair with a number of non-critical deficiencies noted. These deficiencies are isolated, and/or result from minor wear and tear, and/or are in the process of being mitigated.

Campus Supervision

School administration and teaching staff place a high priority on providing adequate adult supervision on campus before, during, and after school. As students arrive on campus each morning, staff members are strategically assigned to designated entrance areas and the playground. During recess, campus monitors and parent volunteers supervise playground activity. Four campus monitors and parent volunteers monitor lunch time activity in the cafeteria and on the playground. At the end of the day when students are dismissed, campus monitors monitor student behavior to ensure a safe and orderly departure.

Heritage School is a closed campus. During school hours, all visitors must sign in at the school's office and wear identification badges while on school grounds.

School Site Safety Plan

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for Heritage School in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff in June 2011.

Classroom Environment

Discipline & Climate for Learning

Heritage School's discipline practices and behavior management strategies comply with approved board policies and are designed to create effective learning environments and minimize classroom disruptions. Progressive discipline and proactive measures are employed in the classroom for those students experiencing difficulty following school rules and demonstrating positive behavior. Disciplinary intervention is managed by school administrators in a fair, firm, and consistent manner based upon the nature of each situation.

Curriculum & Instruction

Staff Development

All training and curriculum development activities at Heritage School revolve around the California State Content Standards and Frameworks. Professional development activities continue to support the ongoing implementation of standards-based instruction and formative assessment. School-wide and grade-level collaborative efforts focus on students learning the standards through differentiated instruction. Professional development activities also continue to support the ongoing implementation of Response to Instruction and Intervention (RtI²). All teachers receive training in ELD standards and strategies to help English learners gain access to the core curriculum.

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by the principal using tools such as data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training session as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula. During the 2010-11 school year, Heritage School's teachers attended the following events hosted by the Snowline Joint Unified School District:

- Data Management and Analysis
- English Language Development
- Gifted and Talented Education
- Instruction and Assessment
- Positive Behavior Intervention and Support (PBIS)
- Response to Instruction and Intervention (RtI²)
- Technology

Heritage School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. Instructional aides are provided targeted training focused on teaching strategies and

curriculum content. All staff are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences.

Instructional Materials

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Heritage School are aligned to the California Content Standards and Frameworks. Instructional materials are selected from the state's most recent list of standards-based materials and adopted by the State Board of Education. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials (English/language arts, math, science, and social science).

On Tuesday, September 13, 2011, the Snowline Joint Unified School District's Board of Education held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Education adopted Resolution #12-1019 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, and (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts.

In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARC's the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2011-12 school year, Snowline Joint Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with a textbook or instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

Counseling & Support Staff

Heritage School provides professional, highly qualified staff that provide additional services and support centered on the whole student academically, physically, and mentally. The Counseling and Support Services table in this report illustrates the availability of non-instructional support staff to Heritage School's students. Full-time equivalent (FTE) is a standard measurement used to identify an employee's regular work load on a weekly basis. For example, an FTE of 1.0 designates a full-time position and the employee is on campus and available all day every day of the week; an FTE of 0.5 indicates that the staff member is available and on campus a portion (50%) of the week.

Teacher Assignment

During the 2010-11 school year, Heritage School had 22 teachers who met all credential requirements in accordance with state guidelines. The Federal No Child Left Behind Act requires that all teachers in core subject areas meet certain requirements in order to be considered as "NCLB Compliant." Minimum qualifications include: possession of a bachelor's degree,

possession of an appropriate California teaching credential, and demonstrated competence in core academic subjects. In the table below, which identifies the number of classrooms taught by NCLB-compliant and non-compliant teachers, high poverty schools are those schools in the highest quartile for student participation defined by the free and reduced price meal program. Low poverty schools are those schools that are in the lowest quartile of program participation.

Expenditures Per Student
